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Monthly Review of the Texas Economy—April 2020 By Ali Anari

The Texas economy gained 250,900 nonagricultural jobs from March 2019 to March 2020, an annual growth rate of 2 percent, higher than the nation's employment growth rate of 1 percent (Table 1 and Figure 1). The nongovernment sector added 216,200 jobs, an annual growth rate of 2 percent, also more than the nation's employment growth rate of 1 percent in the private sector (Table 1).

Texas' seasonally adjusted unemployment rate in March 2020 was 4.7 percent, higher than the 3.5 percent rate in March 2019. The nation's rate increased from 3.8 to 4.4 percent (Table 1). The rises in unemployment rates and the slowdown of job growth rates for both the state and the nation are due to the impacts of COVID-19 pandemic on the state and national economies.

Texas Employment Growth Rates by Industry





Figure 2 Texas Transportation, Warehousing, and Utilities Industry

Table 2 shows Texas industries ranked by employment growth rate from March 2019 to March 2020. All Texas industries except mining and logging industry had more jobs in March 2020 than in March 2019. The transportation, warehousing, and utilities industry ranked first in job creation followed by other services industry, professional and business services, construction, financial activities, and education and health services. Figures 2 to 13 show trends in employment growth rates by industry.

Texas Job Shares by Industry and the Government Sector

Table 3 shows Texas industries and the state's government sector ranked by their shares of Texas jobs in March 2020. Of the 12,965,900 nonagricultural jobs in March 2020, the highest percentage of employment by industry was in the government sector followed by trade, professional and business services, education and health services, leisure and hospitality, and manufacturing. Since March 2019, professional and business services; education and health services; financial activities; construction; transportation, warehousing, and utilities; and other services have expanded their shares of Texas employment at the expense of the government sector, trade, leisure and hospitality, manufacturing, mining and logging, and the information industry. Figures 14 to 25 show trends in shares of total Texas jobs by industry.

Contributions to Texas Employment Growth Rate by Industry

Texas' statewide employment growth rate of 2 percent, or more exactly 1.9733 percent, from March 2019 to March 2020 is the weighted average of employment growth rates for all Texas industries for the period. Weights are shares of jobs by industry. The contribution of each industry to the statewide employment growth rate is equal to the employment growth rate of that industry multiplied by its share of Texas jobs. Table 4 shows Texas industries and the state's government sector ranked by their contributions to Texas employment growth rates from March 2019 to March 2020. Professional and business services ranked first in contribution to job growth followed by education and health services; government sector; transportation, warehousing, and utilities; construction; and financial activities. Figures 26 to 37 show trends in contributions of Texas industries to Texas job growth rates.

Employment Growth Rates by Texas Metropolitan Areas

All Texas metros except Longview, Tyler, San Angelo, Sherman-Denison, Beaumont, Victoria, and Odessa had more jobs in March 2020 than in March 2019 (Table 5). Dallas-Plano-Irving ranked first in job creation followed by Killeen-Temple, Austin-Round Rock, College Station-Bryan, Houston-The



Woodlands-Sugar Land, and Abilene. Figures 38 to 63 show trends in annual employment growth rates for the state's metropolitan areas.

Texas Job Shares by Metropolitan Area

Table 6 shows Texas metropolitan areas ranked by their shares of total Texas jobs in March 2020. Houston-The Woodlands-Sugar Land had the largest share of Texas jobs followed by Dallas-Plano-Irving, Austin-Round Rock, Fort Worth-Arlington, San Antonio-New Braunfels, El Paso, and McAllen-Edinburg-Mission. Figures 64 to 89 show trends in metropolitan shares of total Texas jobs.

Contributions to Texas' Employment Growth Rate by Metropolitan Area

The statewide employment growth rate of 1.9733 percent in Texas from March 2019 to March 2020 is the weighted average of employment growth rates of all Texas metros for the period. Weights are shares of jobs by area. Each metro's contribution to the statewide employment growth rate is equal to the employment growth rate in that area multiplied by its share of Texas jobs. Table 7 shows Texas metros ranked by their contributions to Texas employment growth rates from March 2019 to March 2020. Dallas-Plano-Irving ranked first followed by Houston-The Woodlands-Sugar Land, Austin-Round Rock, San Antonio-New Braunfels, Fort Worth-Arlington, El Paso, and McAllen-Edinburg-Mission. Figures 90 to 115 show trends in contributions of Texas metros to total Texas job growth rates.

Unemployment Rate by Metropolitan Area

The state's actual unemployment rate in March 2020 was 4.7 percent. Midland had the lowest unemployment rate followed by Amarillo, Austin-Round Rock, College Station-Bryan, Lubbock, Abilene, and San Angelo (Table 8).

Employment Growth Rates by Industry in Largest Texas Metropolitan Areas

Table 9 shows annual employment growth rates by industry in the six largest Texas metropolitan areas from March 2019 to March 2020. Houston-The Woodlands-Sugar Land is currently experiencing positive employment growth rates in the government sector and in all industries except manufacturing. Dallas-Plano-Irving posted employment growth in the area's government sectors and in all industries except other services. San Antonio-New Braunfels is currently experiencing employment growth in the area's government sector and in all industries except information. Fort Worth-Arlington's economy posted employment growth in the area's government sectors and in all industries except manufacturing and leisure and hospitality. Austin-Round Rock is currently experiencing positive employment growth rates in the government sector and in all industries except leisure and hospitality. El Paso's economy posted employment growth in the area's government sectors and in all industries except manufacturing and leisure and hospitality.

Figure 1 Nonfarm Employment Growth Rates for Texas and United States



Annual Employment Growth Rates 2017-2020






Annual Employment Growth Rates, 2017-2020








Share of Total Texas Jobs,2017-2020







Figure 19 Texas Manufacturing Industry Share of Total Texas Jobs,2017-2020






Figure 22 Texas Transportation, Utilities, Warehousing Industry Share of Total Texas Jobs,2017-2020



Texas Information Industry



ual Employment Growth Rates, 2017




Figure 42 Houston-The Woodlands-Sugar Land Metro Area







Figure 43 Abilene Metro Area






Figure 46 Amarillo Metro Area




San Antonio-New Braunfels Metro Area






Figure 49 Texarkana Metro Area






nnual Employment Growth Rates, 2017-20





Figure 53 Lubbock Metro Area





Share of Total Texas Jobs, 2017-2020









Figure 70 McAllen-Edinburg-Mission Metro Area Share of Total Texas Jobs, 2017-2020

Figure 72 Beaumont-Port Arthur Metro Area






Figure 73 Lubbock Metro Area

Figure 75 Brownsville-Harlingen Metro Area Share of Total Texas Jobs, 2017-2020









Figure 79 Midland Metro Area





Figure 83 Odessa Metro Area






Figure 85 Texarkana Metro Area



Sherman-Denison Metro Area





Figure 89 Victoria Metro Area









Figure 94 Fort Worth-Arlington Metro Area





Figure 95 El Paso Metro Area







Figure 100 Amarillo Metro Area







Figure 103 Laredo Metro Area







Figure 106 Midland Metro Area





Figure 110 Vler Metro Area




